# District 11 4-H Crossroads November 18-20, 2016 Hilton Garden Inn, Corpus Christi, TX

### **Event Information**

Crossroads is a three day/two night career development and youth leadership program to involve 8<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grade youth in various projects that will expose them to various career and higher education opportunities.

# **Event Details**

In 2016, District 11 4-H Crossroads will be held at the Hilton Garden Inn in Corpus Christi, TX (6717 S. Padre Island Drive). A copy of the tentative schedule is attached.

### **Event Fee**

Registration will be from September 15 to October 21, 2016. The cost for Crossroads is \$175.00 for 4-H members and \$175.00 for adult leaders and County Extension Agents. A late fee of \$25.00 will be assessed from October 22 – November 11. Late registrants may not receive a tshirt. **No refunds will be given!** 

Payment for Crossroads may be made by county/club check or credit card. The District Office will NOT receive any registration payments for Crossroads. All registration fees (paid by check) must be sent to the Texas 4-H Office.

County Club checks should follow transfer procedures to remit payment

# **Substitution Policy**

Substitutions will be allowed up to one week prior to the event. All substitutions must be submitted to the district office in writing by the County Extension Agent. Substitutions may ONLY be made boy for boy and girl for girl. However, there is no guarantee that the substitute will get the workshops wanted; he/she will most likely be placed in the workshops assigned to the original delegate he/she is replacing.

#### **Event Registration**

Participants (youth, adults and County Extension Agents) must register for District 11 4-H Crossroads on 4-H CONNECT (on-line registration system). The registration will be open from 12:00 a.m. on Thursday, September 15 through 12:00 midnight on Friday, October 21. 4-H members, leaders and County Extension Agents may submit an entry at any time during this registration period.

County Extension Agents must 'certify' all entries on 4-H CONNECT within two business days following the registration deadline. Failure to do so may result in the registration being rejected.

# **Crossroads Check-in/On-site Registration**

Each 4-H member must be checked in and checked out by an adult. Once a 4-H member has checked into Crossroads, he/she must stay until the conclusion of the event. There will be no early departures, or leaving and returning later. And remember: NO 4-H member can drive to Crossroads on his/her own unless granted prior approval from your County Office and the District Office.

Registration is 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Friday, November 18. The absolute deadline to arrive on Friday is 12:00 midnight. The District 4-H Specialist must be notified in writing of a late arrival. If a 4-H member has a valid reason to not arrive on Friday (i.e. playoff football game), he/she may arrive on Saturday. However, Saturday arrivals must be checked in by 8:00 a.m. Workshops will not be delayed for late arrivals. All Saturday arrivals must be approved by the 4-H member's respective County Extension Agent. The closing assembly on Sunday, November 20, will conclude by 10:00 a.m.

### Americans with Disabilities Act

Individuals who require an auxiliary service or accommodation in order to participate in Crossroads need to indicate so and provide an explanation of accommodation(s) needed when registering on 4-H CONNECT. Any additional explanation that needs to be provided can be done by calling the District 11 Office at 361-265-9203 by the registration deadline.

### Age Requirement

Crossroads is restricted to youth in 8<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> grade as of November 18, 2016.

# **Adult Chaperones**

Each adult attending Crossroads is also asked to provide transportation to and from the workshop to which he/she is assigned. A copy of each adult's proof of insurance <u>may</u> be requested by event organizers.

Adult chaperones will be asked to complete the Youth Protection training on 4-H Connect prior to arrival.

The District 11 Guidelines, adopted 12-16-1997, will be followed for this event. The minimum standards of the policy state:

• "If a county has four (4) or more 4-H members attending, the county must send an adult of either gender. When the number of 4-H participants exceeds 8, the adult to member ratio is 1 to 8. Example: If a county sends 12 members, they must send two chaperones. 4-H members opposite the gender of the county adult chaperone must be assigned to an adult chaperone of their gender. Assignments must be made by the member's County Extension Agent. This assignment must then be sent in writing to the District Office five days prior to the event. This letter must state the event, the member's name(s), and the name of the adult chaperone (or agent) from another county that will accept responsibility for the member(s). The assigned adult should be asked before the letter is written.

• If there are three (3) or less participants from a county, without an adult chaperone attending, the members must be assigned to adult chaperones by the member's County Extension Agent. 4-H members must be assigned to adult chaperones of their gender. This assignment must then be sent in writing to the District Office five (5) days prior to the event. This letter must state the event, the member's name(s), and the name of the adult chaperone (or agent) from another county that will accept responsibility for the member(s). The assigned adult chaperone should be asked before the letter is written.

# Transportation

It is the responsibility of each county to provide transportation for participants to and from Crossroads. We strongly encourage youth to travel to a district function with an adult.

Transportation to and from workshops will be provided by adult leaders and County Extension Agents. Each adult attending Crossroads is also asked to provide transportation to and from the workshop to which he/she is assigned. A copy of each adult's proof of auto insurance may be requested.

# **T-Shirts**

When registering, all participants (youth and adults) need to indicate the size of t-shirt preferred. The tshirts will be distributed at Crossroads registration/check-in. All participants (youth and adults) should plan to wear the t-shirt on Saturday of Crossroads.

# **Dress Code**

Dress for Crossroads is casual, but neat. Conventional shoes or sandals must be worn at all times. Items of clothing advertising alcoholic beverages, tobacco products or drugs or that has vulgar, offensive messages are not appropriate. Tank tops, halter tops or tops with spaghetti straps are not appropriate for girls at Crossroads. See-through or muscle shirts are not appropriate for boys at Crossroads. Hats and caps are not appropriate inside buildings.

# What to Bring

All participants (youth and adults) will be housed in hotel rooms. Youth will be four (4) per room and adults will be two (2) per room. Therefore, each participant must bring:

- Pillow (optional)
- Toiletries and personal items
- Light jack or sweater and/or rain gear (depending upon the weather forecast for the weekend)
- Closed toe shoes (i.e. tennis shoes)

Please do not bring valuable electronic equipment.

Crossroad participants may bring snacks. Snacks will be provided during the dance on Saturday night.

Do not bring items such as water guns, water sling shots, shaving cream (except for personal use), etc. If you are caught with these materials, disciplinary action will be taken.

# **Medical Information**

Each participant (youth AND adults, including CEAs) is required to turn in the following forms on 4-H Connect. They are available on the Health Form tab of your profile.

- Waiver and indemnification Agreement and Medical Treatment Authorization
- Health Statement

Each youth participant agreed to the Code of Conduct and Consequences of Misbehavior form when enrolling in 4-H for the 2016-2017 4-H year on 4-H CONNECT. This Code of Conduct policy will be followed during Crossroads.

# **Crossroads Workshops**

There will be five workshops offered at Crossroads this year. When registering, all youth and leaders need to select which workshop they prefer to attend, ranking them 1-5. The committee will work to honor workshop preferences; however, it is not a guarantee that you will get your first choice. The workshops are:

- Marketing/Communications The communications tour (with Laura and Letty) will provide each 4-H'er with a look at a field in communications. Are interested in a career where you have the ability to develop and deliver a targeted message? Or would you like working every day in business, marketing, education, politics and public relations? Come join us as we show you where communications can take you! We will be touring Corpus Christi's local KRIS 6 news station with someone from their marketing/PR team. The news station isn't the last stop! We will also be giving 4-H'ers a look at the academic side of communications. Our tour will be stopping at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi campus where we will get to see the sites, classrooms, and visit with academic advisors. We hope that you will join us for a fun filled day!
- Veterinary Science Take a tour of the Veterinary Science facility at Texas A&M University Kingsville to learn about the program available. A tour of the research facility which will have a hands on learning experience to see the latest research in Veterinary Medicine.
- Wildlife Management Do you enjoy spending time in a deer blind, or behind a shot gun? Then
  come with us to Kingsville to tour Texas A&M University Kingsville and the Caesar Kleberg
  Wildlife Research Institute to learn about career opportunities in wildlife management. You will
  get to meet current wildlife management students to learn wildlife management techniques,
  and tour a premier wildlife research center right here in South Texas. We will also be touring
  the National Natural Toxins Research Center serpentarium.
- Sports Medicine/Health Sciences Are you interested in a rewarding career in the field of health? Come explore the various careers such as nurses, dietitians and community health workers at Coastal Bend Health Education Center, which is part of the College of Medicine at Texas A & M Health Science Center. The Athletic Training Program (ATP) at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi is nationally accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE), joining the company of only 15 other nationally accredited undergraduate programs in Texas. The TAMUCC Athletic Training Program strives to provide

athletic training students a challenging and comprehensive educational experience, which incorporates the values of a supportive academic and clinical community, in order to prepare future leaders in athletic training and allied health professions.

• Marine Biology - The Marine Biology track will take you through the Career Path Tour of the Texas State Aquarium in Corpus Christi.
